ABOUT THE WOMEN'S STUDIES MINOR

Develop a greater respect for diverse populations - and understand yourself

better, too.

Reconsider your assumptions about women, men and gender as you enhance your degree with a minor in women's studies from California University of Pennsylvania.

This 21-credit minor program gives you a framework for examining your experiences and identity within the context of individual, family, national and global systems.

The women's studies curriculum encourages you to analyze the complex intersections of individual and cultural factors, such as gender, sex, race, ethnicity, class, sexual orientation, age, religion and ability. You will examine how these factors relate to power, oppression and social justice, and affect:

- Intimate relationships.
- Family responsibilities.
- Paid work and unpaid work experiences.

Think deeply about issues that shape your view of the world.

Cal U students in the women's studies program engage with interesting and timely topics. They explore factual information and then consider how it influences their views of life, love, women, men, media, politics, healthcare and much more.

These topics are both intriguing and invigorating, students say. The women's studies curriculum also requires students to reflect, personally and professionally, on what they

have learned through their formal education and social/cultural experiences. This makes the women's studies minor a meaningful addition to any academic major.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS: Women's Studies Minor

Career-focused skills: Students in the women' studies program hone their skills in critical analysis and develop the thinking, writing and speaking skills essential to high performance in any career field. Most students who take women's studies courses, especially those who complete the minor, report that they've learned a great deal and enjoyed their classes. In fact, many students say these classes should be required for all students.

Growth opportunities: Women's studies minors have first access to personal and professional development activities, including a three-day Design Your Life retreat and a weeklong off-campus women's leadership conference. Students also have many opportunities outside of class to engage in activism and, as Gandhi said, "be the change you wish to see in the world."

The intention of this scholarship is to support students in their pursuit of feminist ideals through scholarship, personal development, and service. - 2. Analyze gender issues in a global context.
- 3. Recognize the gendered nature of power in interaction with race, ethnicity, class, age, ability, sexuality, region, and religion at the institutional, interpersonal and individual levels.

- 4. Demonstrate respect for and appreciation of differences.
- 5. Apply feminist theory and analysis to their major field of study.
- 6. Place their personal and professional experiences in a social and political context by evaluating women's and men's changing status in society.
- 7. Advocate for and take action to promote social justice by feel comfortable exercising leadership, asking questions and standing up for their beliefs.
- 8. Work collaboratively in an inclusive and civil manner, maintaining an open mind and engaging in constructive dialogue.
- 9. Feel a sense of community connection and support resulting from civic engagement.

Women and Gender Studies is an academic minor that students may take in conjunction with any major course of study.

Women and Gender Studies examines the interplay of gender, race, class, and sexuality by focusing on the experience of women, the concept of gender, and the cultural productions by and about gender within specific contexts and across various identities and academic disciplines.

Students, when they take Women and Gender Studies courses, are encouraged to connect personal experiences with the broader political picture. When they identify social ills or cultural and institutional practices that need improvement, they may develop strategies for change. The Gender and Sexuality Center helps students in moving into activism in issues related to gender. Additionally, the student organization, Feminist Alliance, seeks to raise awareness of gender issues on campus.

Study the Gendered Nature of Women's Experiences The Women's and Gender Studies minor is designed to increase students' interdisciplinary knowledge about the gendered nature of women's experiences and the ways that all genders are shaped by history, culture, and society.

In order to achieve this goal, we offer courses using a variety of theories and methodologies and from a range of disciplines, such as anthropology, art, communication media, criminology, English, the fine arts, journalism, literature, philosophy, political science, psychology, religious studies, and sociology.

We explore gendered hierarchies and the impact of gender on the experiences of women, as well as women- and gendered-centered knowledge productions and learning.

A Year of Learning and Growth

Women's and Gender Studies Showcase What Does Feminism Mean to You?

"To me, feminism means working towards achieving global gender equality. Everyone is born equal, regardless of gender, race, or sexuality. However, there are so many aspects of life in which people are not treated equally: politically, economically, legally, and socially. Feminism is about working against the systems built to keep certain groups of people oppressed, and striving towards equality for everyone. It means fighting for intersectionality and acknowledging how race, sexual orientation and socioeconomic status affects feminism. It means having civil conversations with people I fundamentally disagree with to try and advocate change. It means taking a meaningful stance on injustices and standing up for inequalities, even if I'm the only one standing." —*Angie Prencipe*

Challenge Traditional Theories

Students are encouraged to challenge traditional theories and research regarding women and gender through innovative and experimental classroom experiences and writing assignments. Our students analyze the world, imagine and reenvision it, and seek to enact social transformation in both theory and practice.

A minor in Women's and Gender Studies strengthens and supplements every academic major and later professional careers. Our students' awareness of gendered, sexualized, classed, and racialized hierarchies make them valuable professionals in a range of careers, from business and banking to social work and law.

- No more than two courses that count for a student's major can also count for the Women's and Gender Studies minor.
- Special topics courses that focus on Women's and Gender Studies and are offered by individual departments can count as minor electives with the approval of the director.

Courses in Women's and Gender Studies

WMST 400 Feminist Theories

Introduces the vigorous, interdisciplinary, complex, and diverse intellectual history of feminist theories, methodologies, and politics.

WGS 301 Asian American and Asian Diasporic Literature

Introduces more than 100 years of unique, diverse, and dynamic literary tradition of the 20th and 21st Asian American and Asian diasporic women's literature in a wide range of Asian cultural, historical, and national, global, and American multiethnic contexts.

WGS 281 Girlhood Studies

Girls/Girlhood Studies is an interdisciplinary course that examines the social experience of girls mainly in American society but also makes historical and cross cultural comparisons.

WGS 200 Introduction to Women's and Gender Studies

An interdisciplinary survey of the ways in which gender interacts with race, age, class, ethnicity, nationality, and other dimensions of identities to shape human consciousness and determine social, political, and cultural organizations of human institutions and societies.

SOC 427 Social Perspectives on Partner Violence

Considers the range of theoretical explanations from a social perspective for the pervasive violence between intimate partners.

SOC 410 Men and Masculinities

This is a course description for SOC 410 Men and Masculinities

SOC 363 Sociology of Gender

Explores current perspectives on the situations faced by women and men, primarily in the United States.

SOC 336 Sociology of the Family

A study of family dynamics and patterns using sociological research methodsand theories.

SOC 281 Girlhood Studies

Girls/Girlhood Studies is an interdisciplinary course that examines the social experience of girls mainly in American society, but also makes historical and cross-cultural comparisons.

SOC 251 Sociology of Human Sexuality

In-depth analysis of a formerly taboo topic, human sexuality.

RLST 485 Feminist Study of Religion

To better understand early twentieth-century Japanese society and culture, especially the interrelationship between the "flower and willow world," the performing and visual arts, and Shingon Buddhism

RLST 345 Women in the Bible

Surveys and examines the stories and issues concerning women in the bible.

PSYC 380 Gender and Violence

A multidisciplinary approach to understanding interpersonal violence (across the life span) as impacted by gender.

PSYC 411 Psychology of Women

A critical examination of the assumptions about women which are held by the discipline of psychology, considering both current research and individual experience.

PLSC 404 Women and Politics

Focuses on the role of women in political life and policies that especially affect women in both developing and developed countries.

PSYC 379 Human Sexuality

Provides an overview of the psychological issues and research relevant to sexuality with an emphasis on gender roles.

RLST 245 Women and Religion

Examines women's roles and experiences within some of the world's major religious traditions, both past and present.

JRNL 250 Women and the Press

Explores the role of women in American journalism. Includes study of lives/careers of women journalists and their specific contributions to the profession with emphasis on evolution of equal opportunity for women and other minorities.

HIST 495 Women and World War II

The role of women in World War II has traditionally been celebrated with the familiar image of Rosie the Riveter, the romanticized icon of the female industrial worker.

HIST 369 Women in America

A study of the activities of women from the colonial era to the modern era.

ENGL 350 Gender and Sexual Orientation in Literature, Theory, and Film

Introduces literature, film, and theory that focus primarily on lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender perspectives.

ENGL 336 Language, Gender, and Society

Investigates the various ways that language and gender interact and intersect in society. Examines such questions as: Does society use language to favor one sex over the other? Why is language a crucial component in formulating constructs of masculinity and femininity? What stereotypes of gender-based language are promoted in our society? How can we analyze language to reveal disparate views and treatment of the sexes?

ENGL 225 Introduction to Literature by Women

Major trends and motifs across genres (fiction, nonfiction, poetry, autobiography) which reflect themes and subjects of continuing interest to women writers.

DANC 281 Women & Dance: Stripping the Veils

An interdisciplinary, multiperspective exploration into the roles of women and dance from a historical, cultural, and spiritual vantage point.

CRIM 450 Women and Crime

A study of the nature and extent of women's crime, theories of female criminality, processing of women offenders through the criminal justice system, the response of police and court officials to women as victims of crime, and opportunities for women as employees in criminal justice agencies.

COMM 325 Women in Media

Course provides an overview of women in media (including television, film, radio, the Internet, etc.) and the historical development, along with social context that influence women's involvement in the media.

ANTH 350 Anthropology of Gender

Explores the primary category of social difference into which humans are universally socialized, which is the gendered nature of women's and men's experiences in the world from an anthropological perspective.

WHY CHOOSE WOMEN'S, GENDER, & SEXUALITY STUDIES?

The program encourages the development of an open mind, heart, and voice to all who are willing to listen. In more practical terms, WGS students strive for equity and justice within the workplace, education, and society.

Yet there are still those individuals who ask the questions: "Why WGS?" and "What makes these courses so special, and how could taking them possibly impact my life?" The answer is simple. WGS does more than just explore issues concerning women. It delves into the heart of the global expression and subordination of all marginalized populations and examines the concepts of established norms around gender and sexuality and investigates inequities. WGS forces students to design their own solutions to these problems they see every day.

"All students need to realize that social, professional and educational equity is not a benefit, but a necessity. If a university's student community could learn to become free of sexism, racism and all other forms of discrimination, they could set an example for their own, as well as the next, generation to follow.

"In the past, women and men studied history, science, the arts, the social sciences, even women, entirely from the perspective of men. Criteria for Inclusion of Courses in the Women's Studies Minor:

The Women's Studies Committee has created the following guidelines for Women's Studies courses at Mansfield University. Women's Studies courses will be taught from a feminist perspective in that they meet some, if not all, of the following guidelines:

- 1. The course puts women and women's experiences at the center of study.
- 2. The course considers "traditional" research or canons from the perspective of gender
- 3. The course incorporates gender theories of inequality.
- 4. The course is taught from a cross-cultural perspective, utilizing content and possibly pedagogical approaches from a diversity of cultures (both North American, i.e. African-American, Hispanic, Native American and Asian-American, and international cultures).
- 5. The course demonstrates a recognition that the marginalization of women is comparable to that of other groups marginalized because of race, social class, ethnicity, and sexual identity.
- 6. The course includes current scholarship on and by women.
- 7. The course recognizes a connection between the private or domestic and public spheres of life.
- 8. The course recognizes the link between its content and other disciplines (perhaps through including some material from other disciplines or by taking an interdisciplinary approach.
- 9. Teaching methods for the course include efforts to focus on student empowerment and to decentralize authority in the classroom (e.g. collaborative learning).

***Please note: The Women's Studies Steering Committee sees criteria #1 as absolutely crucial and requires that at least half of the materials studied in a literature class be written by women and that at least half of the course content be about women.

The Disability Studies Minor provides students with a cutting-edge, interdisciplinary body of knowledge and skills geared toward the exploration of the meaning and impact of disability across time, place, and group. As a field akin to Women's and Gender Studies and Ethnic Studies, Disability Studies sees individuals with disabilities as a valuable and integral part of the human community, and it examines the ways in which understandings of disability shape the fundamental aspects of our lives, relationships, and societies. In addition, the program raises awareness of disability issues, knowledge of disability rights and laws, and best practices towards creative toward inclusive and accessible environments and communities. BS Interdisciplinary Programs: Gender and Diversity Studies

Our Vision: To prepare students as scholars, professionals, and social justice advocates to become agents of positive change for a diverse and inclusive global future.

Mission Statement: The Gender Studies Program provides interdisciplinary opportunities to understand gender in intersectional contexts and to analyze structural and systemic forms of privilege and oppression. Student-scholars share, present and publish their work and develop as professionals and leaders as they become life-long learners in the best sense of that term: curious, committed, respectful of diverse perspectives and passionate about their ability to make our world a better place.

What will you learn as a Gender Studies student?

You'll learn how identity markers like race, class, and gender impact individual lives, social group formation, and patterns of power and privilege. You will:

- Develop an awareness of and an ability to address sensitive issues with respect for and understanding of diverse perspectives, values and backgrounds
- Gain an understanding of how power structures are created, maintained and challenged within cultural, economic, historical and political contexts
- Learn to think critically about and gain an appreciation of the culturally specific experiences of sex, gender, race, and other identity categories
- Apply what you've learned to social, professional and community environments
- Participate in internships to apply what you've learned, acquire practical experience in the workforce, and create professional networks.

Gender Studies Minor Requirement (18 credits)

Students are required to take

GNDR 115: Intro Gender Studies Introduction to Gender Studies is an interdisciplinary course that offers a foundation for an intersectional analyses of gender within the context of systems and structures of power and oppression.

And five additional courses from the following:

EGEO 368 Women in Science This course will explore the issues of women in science. Specifically it will address the issues of gender in relation to the theory and practice of science and technology. The course content will use case studies to explore women that have made significant contributions to science despite barriers limiting their access to education and professional organizations. The content will cover topics including how the development of educational systems and professions affected women over the centuries, how scientific approaches have evolved, and how women meet challenges in today's scientific community. The case studies will provide students with the opportunity to analyze and synthesize the information presented into an understanding on the evolution of scientific thought and women''s roles in science.

ENGL 243 Literature of the Women's Movement Women authors from various periods read with a woman's perspective on the world. Prerequisite: ENGL 101 and 210 or English Major status

GERO 425 Women and Aging Examines the effects of women growing older in a changing society. Social, psychological, physical, economic, cultural, and political implications will be discussed, including health concerns, changing roles, and discrimination.

GES 105 World Regional Geography – designated sections This course provides an introduction to the regional concept, classification of major culture regions throughout the world and a description of the physiocultural character of those regions. This section integrates a focus on gender in an intersectional context.

GES 361 Gender & the Environment Gender and the Environment will explore the ways that human interaction with the natural environment is shaped by gender roles and gender inequality in cultures around the world. Topics covered will include tgender differences in resource access, connections between environmental degradation and women's oppression, cultural metaphors that link nature and gender (e.g. "mother earth") and the way that gender shapes environmental movements. One other Geography or Gender Studies course.

GNDR 120: Intro Study Masculinities This course introduces and explores the topic of masculinity as a subject for critical study. In the course, students will read about and discuss how masculinities are constructed, presented and reproduced in media and popular culture. This course is meant for and open to everyone interested in taking a critical approach to the study of gender in societies, with specific focus on how (especially american) masculinities shape and are shaped by identity, culture, media, war, politics and economics.

GNDR 280: Intro Disability Studies An introduction to the field of Disability Studies, which rejects medical paradigms and instead analyzes disability as a social, cultural and

ideological phenomenon, with an intersectional and interdisciplinary focus on gender, race and socioeconomic status.

GNDR 340: Applied Queer Studies An introduction to the field of queer studies with an applied focus (on race, disability, age, ethnicity, transnational issues) in an intersectional and interdisciplinary context. The course analyzes the historical, cultural, political and discursive production of LGBTQAI+ identities, heteronormativity as a form of control, and LGBTQAI+ activism and advocacy.

GNDR 400: Gender Studies and Porn Culture Integrating feminist, sociological, media, marketing, neurological, and philosophical perspectives, the course analyzes the social implications of porn consumption, porn production and methods of porn distribution, including technological developments (for example, 3D software developments and the use of artificial intelligence in sex dolls). While gender organizes the analytic approaches of the course, it considers other embodied and intersectional identities as well.

GNDR 415 Feminist Perspectives in the Disciplines This course will explore feminist approaches to pedagogy and research in the humanities, social sciences, and natural sciences, highlighting how such approaches reshape and redirect the ways knowledge is constructed as well as the attendant, transformed results.

GNDR 450 Internship Professional experiences, such as working with the Girl Scouts or state National Organization for Women (NOW), or working in a women's center or abuse/sexual assault center, that will allow students to either apply or function within a feminist framework to understand the complexity of women's lives and contribute to women's opportunities.

GNDR 490 Independent Study Independent Study courses give students the opportunity to pursue research and/or studies that are not part of the university's traditional course offerings. Students work one on one or in small groups with faculty guidance and are typically required to submit a final paper or project as determined by the supervising professor.

HIST 313 History of Manhood in America An examination of expressions of manhood in American History from the colonial era to the present. Through the use of gender as a category of historical analysis, students will study notions of manhood in social relations, sexuality, the economy and politics.

HIST 318 Gender and Sexuality in European Society This course examines gender and sexuality in European society with emphasis on the relationship between ideas about gender and sexuality and their social and cultural manifestations.

HIS T 319 History of Women to 1750 An analysis of women from the earliest civilizations to 1750 through the examination of the lives of ordinary and outstanding women from different levels of the social order.

HLTH 211 Women's Health Issues Examines the role of women as consumers and as both formal and informal providers of health services.

MUSI 301 Women and Music

PHIL 336 Philosophy of Gender and Sex This course will examine concepts, values and assumptions relevant to gender and sex in our diverse society. topics to be explored may include the ontological status of gender and sex; the cultural representations of masculinity, femininity and sexuality; or the relationship between gender, society and power, and its epistemological and ethical consequences.

POLS 313 Gay and Lesbian Politics

POLS 349 Utopian Experiments: Issues of Gender and Power This course will examine the various alternative plans for the intentional restructuring of society as exhibited in the works of utopian theorists.

POLS 375 Women and Politics The course will examine the effect of socialization and the impact of culture on women, gender differences in patterns of political participation; legal, political and social rights of women; and the effects of the political system upon the lives of women and their families.

INDP 339 Gender Roles and Society An examination of gender roles, what they are, how they develop and how they are maintained. An examination of the effects of gender roles on education, occupation, the polity and other institutions as well as the effects of role restrictions of personal relationships. Note: This course is taught from either a sociological or anthropological viewpoint. The student should check with the instructor to determine the approach being taken in the current offering.

INDP 360 Women in Asian Societies Students will have an opportunity to gain an in depth understanding of the issues surrounding the roles and status of women in a rapidly changing Asia; from both a historic and a current context. These issues, which are political, religious, economic, health, social justice and legal, among others are vital for women in Asia, their societies as well as this ever globalizing world.

PSYC 300 Psychology of Women, Gender & Culture Overview of psychological perspectives and current research concerning the field of the psychology of women and gender. Topics related to the role of culture in the social construction of gender will be emphasized. Topics include similarities and differences between women and men, gender development, emotions, relationships, sexuality, education and work, health and fitness, psychological distress, and social roles.

PSYC 315 Psychology of Gender and Sexual Diversity Overview of psychological perspectives and current research concerning the field of lesbian, gay, bisexual,

transgender and queer psychology. The course takes a life-span developmental perspective and examines the diversity of gender and sexual identities. Topics include theories of sexual orientation and gender identity, oppression and discrimination, history of the Queer community and the coming out process.

DEPARTMENT OVERVIEW

In this major and minor, students learn about, analyze, and apply:

Intersectionality

How categories of identity (race, class, gender, age, ability, sexuality, nationality, etc.) and structures of inequality are historically and currently experienced, represented, and resisted by people

Transnational Feminisms

How the theoretical issues examined through intersectional feminism are produced in specific cultural global contexts

Gender

How gender operates in our lives—as women, men, and those for whom those categories do not apply

West Chester University offers a major (30 credits) and a minor (18 credits) in Women's and Gender Studies. **From Course Catalog:**

WOS 100. Body Politics: Gender, Culture, and Representation. 3 Credits.

This course examines the body as a contested site of both pleasure and oppression. Considerable focus will be placed on the impact of culture on our understandings of the body, including ideas about gender, race, and sexuality. Students of all genders will be encouraged to explore how their own body image has been shaped by social norms that are simultaneously accepted and resisted. This course thereby provides an opportunity to question a variety of norms surrounding the body, including ideas about beauty, size, shape and ability.

WOS 225. Intro to Women's and Gender Studies. 3 Credits.

An interdisciplinary course designed to enable students to analyze the lived experience of women, to evaluate the impact of gender, to question the implications of changing cultural patterns, and to sample first-hand efforts for social change. Satisfies interdisciplinary requirement. Offered every semester.

WOS 250. Women's Self Representation. 3 Credits.

An interdisciplinary approach to ways women record their lives.

WOS 276. Sexual Identity. 3 Credits.

Interdisciplinary introduction to meanings attached to human sexuality, exploring intersections between theories of sexual identity and theories of gender, class, race, ethnicity, age, and nationality.

WOS 305. Intellectual Roots of Western Feminism. 3 Credits.

The course examines the major issues and themes that have historically been included in feminist theorizing about women's situation and experiences, including: ethical foundations, the origins of patriarchy, feminist epistemology, education, body issues, issues of difference, religion, civil rights, and psychological development. Chronologically, the course covers from the enlightenment (Mary Wollstonecraft's A Vindication of the Rights of Women) through Simone de Beauvoir's The Second Sex.

WOS 306. Transnational Feminisms. 3 Credits.

This course critically engages a range of transnational feminist theories, movements, and praxis to analyze structures of power shaping people's lives in global contexts. The course seeks to decenter a body of feminist scholarship that often assumes shared visions of gender equality. Such studies conceptualize gender issues and concerns through a Eurocentric/colonial viewpoint by overlooking differences among people with respect to race, class, sexuality, and nationality. Course readings explore the ethics of cross-cultural knowledge production, activism, warfare, commodification of women's bodies, sexualities, and local resources. The main goals of the course are to expose students to a broad range of feminist thought and action and locate transnational feminist theories in relation to colonial and post-colonial narratives. It urges students to examine their own positions within global systems that connect the (often uneven) exchange of persons, capital, and ways of knowing.

WOS 310. Women and Activism. 3 Credits.

Although often misrepresented or ignored, women were and continue to be active in a wide range of social justice movements. This course focuses specifically upon women activists in the United States and their resistance to structural inequalities based upon gender. In addition to social justice movements focused on sexism, this course uses intersectional theory to recognize the feminist value of women who work against racial, economic, sexual, and other oppressions.

WOS 315. Women of the Global South. 3 Credits.

This course will examine the nature of women's lives in the global South, focusing on topics such as family, education, health, development policies, and political change. Geographic areas studied include Africa, Asia, Latin America, and the Middle East.

WOS 320. Independent Study. 3 Credits.

Independent research and study for upper-division students. Topic to be approved by supervising faculty member.

WOS 325. Special Topics. 3 Credits.

Selected (and changing) topics, e.g., Ethnic Women; Women and Work; Love and Sexuality. Offered as projected enrollments warrant.

WOS 326. Women and Witchcraft in Africa. 3 Credits.

This course utilizes witchcraft belief and accusation as a lens through which to examine the oppression of women in sub-Saharan Africa. It examines historical and contemporary beliefs and manifestations of witchcraft, and analyzes the centrality of women (and children) as victims. It also examines the impact of witchcraft accusation on women's social and economic development.

WOS 329. Gender and Peace. 3 Credits.

An examination of the ways in which social constructions of gender intersect with perceptions and the experience of war.

WOS 335. Gender, Race and Science. 3 Credits.

A course on the role of gender and race in the formation of science.

WOS 350. Lesbian Studies. 3 Credits.

This course offers an interdisciplinary introduction to lesbian studies that focuses on the historical and contemporary diversity of lesbian genders and sexualities, especially as shaped by race, class, culture, and nation. Special attention will be placed upon lesbian activism as well as contestations within lesbian communities about racism, classism, and cissexism.

WOS 366. Gender, Labor and Globalization. 3 Credits.

Sociological and feminist analysis of global labor issues such as immigration, citizenship, motherhood, childcare, emotional labor, guest workers, commodification, and exploitation.

WOS 381. The Forgotten Queens of Islam. 3 Credits.

For the past 1,400 years, women have had a profound impact on institutions and ideologies in the Islamic world. They have mastered branches of knowledge, produced

works of culture, amassed wealth, and even ruled as queens. In this course, students will read about prominent women's lives in historical texts from the Islamic world, focusing on the period from 600-1700 CE. Students will learn to read these historical texts "against the grain" through the lens of feminist history, which uses female perspectives to reframe and reconfigure our understanding of the past. By the end of the course, students will be equipped to analyze the various forms of power that have historically been available (and unavailable) to women in the Islamic Middle East, and to assess the many ways women have navigated unequal power structures in order to participate in their polities.

WOS 385. Feminist Theory. 3 Credits.

This course focuses on the development of contemporary feminist theoretical constructs, beginning in the 1970s. Students will study classic feminist theories and ideas from this period. They will use a feminist pedagogy which emphasizes learning that is collaborative and student-centered. We value participatory, experiential, diverse, and student-centered knowledge production. Because we believe that students serve as sources of knowledge for themselves and each other, we encourage students to take initiative in and responsibility for the learning process.

WOS 400. Internship. 3 Credits.

This course is designed to allow students the opportunity to put into practice, outside the academic setting, the knowledge regarding women's experiences gained in other courses. Some possible sites might be a women's health clinic, a business, a newspaper, a social service agency, or an electoral campaign. There will be both an onsite and a faculty supervisor.

WOS 410. Senior colloquium. 3 Credits.

Sample topics include global feminism, mothering, the experiences of women of color, and feminist utopias.

WOS 415. Senior Project. 3 Credits.

Preparation of research in any area of women's studies, to be decided by student and adviser. Supervision includes exercises in method and bibliography. Usually, a lengthy research paper will be the final result.
